Fix our marina

Temporary fencing, peeling paint and boarded-up windows.

This is what confronts tourists who walk along the waterfront

next to one of Port Douglas's biggest tourism drawcards, the Crystalbrook Superyacht Marina.

The marina has lived through several unrealised redevelopment plans across the past decade dating back through two separate ownerships, and tourism operators spoken to by Newsport say another one is needed soon for the town to keep moving.

About Newsport | Park dog push

More than 3000 people have signed a nationwide petition for authorities to allow dogs on leashes into Australia's national parks.

The petition, started by NSW dog owner Shandra Coppard, says, in order to visit one of about 650 national parks across the country, dog owners either need to find a dog or house sitter, use expensive kennels, or be excluded from many parts of Australia.

"This law makes it very difficult for many Australians with their family pet to visit some of the most beautiful areas in Australia," she says. "We would therefore like to see the law changed to allow dogs into national parks with their owners, providing the dogs are kept on leashes and owners clean up any poops."

Ms Coppard thanked everyone who had signed the petition since it was launched late last month, and she was now trying to share it on online traveller pages.

Queensland Parks and Forests state that dogs are not allowed in parks because they "provide a much-needed refuge for native

plants and animals". "While dogs and other pets may be a valued part of a family, they're a real threat to our native animals," an online statement reads.

Reef alarm bells ringing

Great Barrier Reef protection organisations have spoken out about State Government plans to keep coal-powered stations open for longer and introduce more gas-fired stations, saying it will be disastrous for the environment and Far North Queensland tourism.

Energy Minister David Janetzki this month announced a fiveyear plan which was "committed to delivering affordable, reliable and sustainable energy to Queenslanders".

"We're taking an approach based on economics and engineering, not ideology," Minister Janetzki said.

This includes upgrades at the Callide coal-fired power station in Central Queensland with a view to keeping it open for about three years longer.

But a statement from the Australian Marine Conservation Society called the announcement "pro-fossil fuel".

"Queensland Energy Minister David Janetzki's plan spells disaster for the Great Barrier Reef," the statement read.







Rental crisis impacting skilled-worker shortage

A chronic shortage of affordable rental properties in Douglas Shire is increasingly hampering the ability to lure and retain skilled workers to the region.

A Douglas Shire Council study released at the end of last financial year showed factors such as about 60 per cent of potential rental homes being used for short-term housing such as Airbnbs, rising rents, and a lack of housing stock, were contributing to ongoing issues with attracting employees such as doctors, nurses, childcare workers, chefs and tradies.

And, since that report was tabled, new figures show rental stocks are even scarcer and prices are at all-time highs. The median house rental price in Port Douglas for the year up to March was \$750 per week, up from \$525 for the same period in 2020.

And the median unit price in Port Douglas for the year up to March was \$550 per week, up from \$350 in 2020.

There were less than 10 houses available for rent in the town in the past month, while there were more than 140 people looking, and there were 46 units available to rent, but more than 320 people looking. In Mossman, the median house rental price for the same period was \$525, up from \$350 in 2020, while the median unit rental price was \$350, up from \$260.

But there were only two houses put up for rent last month, with 21

renters looking, and no units were offered for the whole month.

Housing price data organisation Core Logic's head of research Tim Lawless said rental unaffordability across the country was at "record highs".

"Renters are dedicating roughly about a third of their incomes, their gross annual incomes, to paying their rent," Mr Lawless said.

In Douglas Shire, that figure is on point, according to the council's 2024 Local Housing Action Plan report.

In the 2021 Census, 36 per cent of the 1409 rental households in Douglas Shire were paying more than 30 per cent of their income on rent, with that number on the increase

SHIRE'S TOP PUBS

The Royal Hotel has been crowned the most popular name for pubs in Queensland, according to the Office of Liquor and Gaming Regulation with a couple of Douglas Shire region drinking holes getting a tick in the top five.

The Exchange Hotel in Mossman might not be the pub it once was, but it is among the more popular names of hotels across the state, coming in equal fourth with the Australian with 10 hotels named Exchange.

And, in Port Douglas, The Central gets the nod, at number 5.

TINAROO DAM TRAGEDY

The body of a man who went missing in Tinaroo Dam at Yungaburra has been found by rescue crews.

The 62-year-old man swam out to help two children on kayaks but failed to resurface after going under. Emergency services were called just after 3.30pm on Sunday, April 13.

An extensive search was launched, which continued until the body was found Monday, April 14

DISASTER CENTRE PROMISE

A \$5.77m disaster coordination centre in Douglas Shire will mostly be funded by the federal government if the LNP gets into power at the May 3 federal Election, the Leichhardt candidate has promised.

LNP candidate Jeremy Neal made a pledge to provide \$5m for the new centre, meaning Douglas Shire Council would likely need to find an extra \$770,000 to get the project across the line.

If built, the purpose-built centre is expected to improve disaster preparedness, recovery and resilience across the Shire and broader Far North Queensland region, according to the council.

Hopping in to Easter weekend fun

People across Douglas Shire celebrated the Easter long weekend in style.

Children took place in a biscuit-making workshop at Steep Port Douglas in the lead-up to the weekend, and the Daintree ferry was packed on Thursday, with holiday-makers heading north.

The traditional Easter fare of seafood was selling like hot crossed buns down at the Port Douglas waterfront Friday. Santiego Seafoods' Tracey Moull was selling from the back of the boat.

"Easter's one of the busiest sales times, Easter and Christmas," Tracey said.

Douglas Shire Mayor Lisa Scomazzon, chief executive Scott Osman, state Tourism Minister Andrew Powell, Cook MP David Kempton, Tourism Port Douglas Daintree representatives and business operators met this month to discuss the tourism priorities for the region, with the marina high on that list.

The most grandiose of past marina plans, which included a six-star hotel, waterfront pool and splash-park area, was unveiled by current owner Crystalbrook Collection in 2019, with then Port Douglas Shire mayor Julia Leu celebrating its arrival.

"They have a really exciting vision for the Crystalbrook Superyacht Marina that has the potential to revitalise Port Douglas

and stimulate the local economy," she said at the time.

And before that \$200m plan, Crystalbrook was reportedly working on a \$100m development in 2017 which included a 100-room luxury hotel, 50 premium homes, more shops and restaurants, and a 24-berth marina expansion. Crystalbrook Collection owner Ghassan Aboud said at the time the company believed it

could "redefine the Australian marina experience and ensure Port Douglas is an essential-visit location for high-end global travellers".

Prior to that announcement, former owners Andrew Hooper-Nguyen and Chris Ellis had council-approved plans for a new hotel and apartment complex.

However, in March last year, many Port locals were surprised when the marina was placed on the market by Crystalbrook. Expressions of interest closed on May 1, 2024, but the property went unsold.

In June, representatives of international commercial real estate company CBRE told Newsport it was continuing "to engage in discussions with prospective buyers".

But one property-industry insider told Newsport this month market speculators have valued the marina at less than what the seller wants to be paid. He mentioned a figure of \$35m-\$40m, but that could not be independently verified.

The site is Queensland's northernmost marina, with 135 berths available for permanent and visiting vessels, five fisherman berths and a fuel wharf. The marina takes up 10ha at 44 Wharf Street,

Newsport has reached out to Crystalbrook for comment.







New RSL president has huge Anzac Day vision

Incoming Mossman RSL president John Grime has a packed schedule across the next week as Anzac Day looms large on Friday.

The Royal Australian Air Force ex-serviceman, whose fading British accent also gives away his 20 years in the Royal Air Force before moving to Australia, has a host of meetings, presentations and speeches planned out this week during the busiest time on the RSL calendar - not to mention helping set everything up on the day.

Long-serving former president Ron Savage and secretary Wally Gray have been showing John the ropes at one of north Queensland's most well-supported RSLs in the lead-up to the big occasion - the 111th anniversary of the start of World War I.

"Anzac Day for me, it's the fact that every part of the community turns up," John says. "There are kids there that are two and three years old, there's all the vets and Ron, Wally, members of the RSL.

"And everything in between."

John says attendances have been growing steadily in the four years he has lived in Douglas Shire after moving up from where he

served in Adelaide. "Not suddenly there's 8000 people there, but you can tell when you get there this is bigger than last year."

The trio is expecting about 1500 for the dawn service in front of the council chambers at Mossman, and about 2500 at the march in Port Douglas from 10am, although Ron says he is never quite sure about the exact numbers.

"I get asked that every year but I don't have a bloody clue because I'm too busy," he says.

A group of navy sailors from Australian Defence Vessel Cape Fourcroy will be taking part this year, and there may even be a special appearance from World War II veteran John "Johnno" Johnson.

Johnno always tries to make the service, depending on his health, except the year he missed out after accidentally locking himself inside his hotel room.

"He couldn't find his damn key and he was very disappointed," Wally says.

Where you all can attend on the occasion

There are a host of events in Douglas Shire on Anzac Day, Friday, April 25, to commemorate the significant day.

The dawn service at the Mossman cenotaph on Front Street will begin at 5.15am, with official proceedings starting at 5.25am.

Dignitaries from the Mossman RSL, the clergy, and the Douglas Shire Council will be present to honour the fallen and those who have served.

In Port Douglas, people will gather at Port Village in Macrossan Street from 10am and begin the march towards the cenotaph at 10:15am. The official proceedings will start at the memorial in Anzac Park at 10.30am.

In Cow Bay, attendees will meet at My Pathways carpark on Cape Tribulation Road at 5am and march to the Cow Bay Cenotaph. Official proceedings will begin at 5.25am. To accommodate those attending services, the Daintree Ferry will operate from 4am.

There will also be a ceremony before the Crocs AFL game at Port Douglas oval just before the senior's game at 4pm.

Cenotaph upgraded and ready to go

The Mossman Cenotaph on Front Street near the council chambers has been upgraded following about six years of lobbying by the local RSL hierarchy.

Secretary Wally Gray said the limited space around the monument was difficult for wheelchair

users to negotiate, so he and former president Ron Savage wanted the space redesigned. Wally said he had been fighting for six years for Douglas Shire Council to make the changes.

"You get a wheelchair around there, about half a dozen turns until you got it round the corner, and then you'd do the same with the next one," Wally said.

Ron said everyone would now be able to better access the cenotaph.

"The previous problem was that people would just come to

the front, everyone would try and crowd and put stuff there and they'd all be falling on the ground and everything, so now you can get around it."

The area has also been landscaped. The pair thanked the council for doing the works.



Splash park delays

Monsoonal weather has pushed back the completion date of the Port Douglas Splash Park to August, as work takes place to install a new sewer system at the site later this month.

Before it can be plumbed, contractors have been sucking ground moisture from the site from April 11-21.

During this close-to-fortnight period, a stretch of Garrick Street will be closed, and a generator will be running 24/7.

Douglas Shire Council Mayor Lisa Scomazzon apologised for the inconvenience during this time.

"Council has already contacted businesses and residents directly impacted by the closure. While it will be an inconvenience, we ask for patience as we take this critical next step in the Splash Park's development," Mayor Scomazzon said.

Across the previous couple of weeks, the contractor has been working on excavating and installing balance tanks to store the water needed for the splash park.

Due to the recent monsoonal weather, the completion date for the project is expected to be in late July to early August.

Run events added to Gran Fondo

A series of distance running events has been added to the popular Port Douglas Gran Fondo Festival.

The festival, which will be held in September, has added 2km, 5km, 10km and 21.1km running events to the program, which already includes a series of cycling races.

Runners will follow a track along the Port Douglas wharf area, Flagstaff Hill, along Four Mile Beach and through the Sheraton Grand Mirage Resort, which has signed up as a major sponsor of the events.
